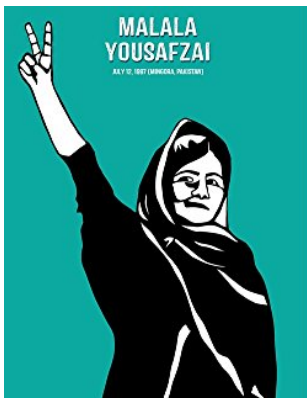

Just a few years earlier, Malala had been in a hospital bed in Pakistan, fighting for her life. The 11-year-old had been shot in the head, and no one expected her to survive. If she did make it, her doctors said, she almost certainly wouldn't be able to walk, read, or speak.

The next year, Malala was part of a terrorist group called the Taliban, who believe women and girls should not have rights. They controlled her town in northwest Pakistan, near the Afghanistan border. They burned textbooks, destroyed schools, and attacked girls who tried to learn.

A British news organization called the BBC had wanted to do a local broadcast to write about what was happening. They reached out to Malala's father, a teacher, and he asked his daughter if she'd like to do it. Malala's story was published on the BBC's website for 10 weeks, and people all over the world read her story. This brought Malala respect and admiration, but it also made her a target.

The Taliban went on to find and kill her. They did shoot her, but they didn't take her life or her spirit. In fact, they only made her stronger.

Malala's recovery was miraculous and fast. The world was outraged by the attack, and the public by Malala received gave her a platform to speak about what is most important to her: peace and education. She wrote a bestselling book, *I Am Malala*, and has traveled around the world, meeting everyone from Queen Elizabeth to Madonna.

Some call her "The Braveest Girl in the World." She's a role model for girls in schools around the world. In her Nobel Prize acceptance speech, she dedicated the award to all girls who cannot attend school. She's also credited for her own education: she passed her final exams with all A's, and plans to attend university.

Like many children around the world, Malala was born into a place of great turmoil. But her region of the world is also rich with history, traditions, and strong female leaders. In fact, Malala is named after Malala of Malwa, a famous Afghan heroine. During a war in 1843, a female hero named Malala (the word means "of Malwa") was the only woman who survived to the British. Malala was shot down by the enemy, but her actions
